
## **CMS-AFRICA** 'FOOTPRINTS'

## CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

## MISSIONS TAKING ROOT:

Five years ago, CMS-Africa laid out a strategy to fulfill her mission mandate beginning from Africa into the uttermost parts of the world. This assumption of responsibility appeared to have been enthused by the challenge of the likes British theologian and missiologist Prof. Andrew Walls who believes that 'the center of Christianity has moved to the southern world; to Africa and Asia.' However, the gap between such a well articulated task and its implementation is often wide. Possibly due to poorly developed mission infrastructure.

At CMS-Africa we saw the need to take responsibility and be the new expression of God's mission in the world. Our approach to ENABLE the church in Africa be mission-minded, is laying the foundation upon which this call will be answered. Over the last year, we have been focusing on our champions throughout Africa whose ministry and service in variety of fields have given shape to the picture of things to come.

My persuasion is this, that as long as the church exists in Africa, missions will take root. "God of mission has a church in the world," wrote Tim Dearborn, the Director of Faith and Development Programmes for the World Vision International in his book; Beyond Duty. God's church falters from exhaustion because Christians erroneously think that God has given them a mission in the world. Rather, the God of mission has given his church to the world. It is not the church of God that has a mission in the world, but the God of mission who has a church in the world. The church's involvement in mission is its privileged participation in the actions of the triune God. We all know human lives are only transformed by the grace of God, not by


human effort.




# INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT

CMS-Africa, in response to the Nazareth manifesto and the context of Africa, has taken up the theme of stewardship with a focus on "Economic Empowerment" as we equip leaders in the church and leaders of the church to realize and release resources for wholistic transforming mission.


Key outputs of our strategic focus are Mobilization, Modelling and Multiplying. The desired outcomes are Communities of Best Practice that are manifesting at least one indicator of transformation. The mobilization process is initiated with a 4 to 5-day VI-SION Conference that addresses the poverty mindset which has kept many Africans in bondage. As communities of faith learn to address their own problems and begin this process by using their own locally-available resources, this generational cyclic poverty propagated by often subconsciously-held cultural values and practices is broken.

CMS-Africa is working to see a critical mass

of at least five transformed communities in five African nations in the next five years. We believe this critical mass of Communities modeling transformation is key to seeing a continent transformed. These communities can then begin to multiply as others come and see and imitate their faith and obedience. We are inspired by the Apostle Paul's strategy for transformation as expressed in

### 1 Thessalonians:

For we know, brothers loved by God, that he has chosen you, because our gospel came to you not simply with words, but also with power, with the Holy Spirit and with deep conviction. You know how we lived among you for your sake. You became imitators of us and of the Lord; in spite of severe suffering, you welcomed the message with the joy given by the Holy Spirit. And so you became a model to all the believers in Macedonia and Achaia. The Lord's message rang out from you not only in Macedonia and Achaia—your faith in God has become known everywhere. Therefore we do not need to say anything about it,



## CROSS CULTURAL MISSION "LESSONS FROM UGANDA" CROSS OUR STORIES



A GROUP OF 40 INCLUDING CLERGY AND LAITY FROM MACHAKOS DIOCESE IN KENYA TOURED MUKONO DIOCESE IN UGANDA FOR CROSS-CULTURAL MIS-SION EXCHANGE AND TO 'SEAL THE DEAL' OF A GROWING PARTNERSHIP BETWEEN THE TWO ANGLICAN CHURCH DIOCESES IN AFRICA.

Upon their return, Bishop Joseph Kanuku of Machakos Diocese now famed for the pilot phase of the CMS biogas project was full of praise for Mukono Diocese and its bishop Rt. Rev James Ssebaggala, having seen what God did for his clergy who were more than eager to testify of the many things they witnessed in Uganda in the various parishes they were attached to during their two weeks of mission.

"This partnership between Machakos and Mukono is now a reality and CMS-Africa assisted us so that we could go to Uganda. I stayed with the bishop, while my clergy went to be with the people," said Bishop Kanuku.

It was really an overwhelming experience for some of the clergy who had accompanied the bishop.

"It was my first time outside Kenya!" narrated an excited Rev. Antony Ngovi from Kithangathini Parish in Machakos. "While in Uganda, I saw the move of Christ and his revival in Lugazi where I was attached. I have never before preached to a police officer to accept Christ, I have also never spoken to a group of pregnant women, yet I got chance to do so in Uganda - I spoke to patients in a hospital, high school students, workers of Lugazi Sugar Factory and also addressed a morning parade of police officers from nearby Lugazi station – the people were very receptive to the gospel," he said.

In one of the services led by Machakos diocese Administrative Secretary Rev. Francis Matui, a woman threw her religious dress interrupting a sermon and shouted on top of her voice that she wanted to receive Christ. She pleaded to God for her children who she said were in a far country for religious reasons. At the end, she was baptized and many other members of her former religion accepted Christ.

" I stopped counting the number of those who accepted Christ and were being baptized and confirmed when they reached 75. Many came to Christ especially students in the many schools that we visited," said Rev. Matui.

Rev. Philip Muthoka of Kibwezi parish was in Nakanyonyi parish. For him, the first contrast was the climate.

Kibwezi is a dry area and very little is grown and harvested. Nakanyonyi is where hundreds of acres of diocesan farms are located. This is where the diocesan Agricultural demonstration farm is also located. For him it was easy to spot the odds and similarities between the two dioceses.

"No single church I visited had less than 10 acres of land and there is a lot of rain compared to Kibwezi, yet people here claim to be poor to the extent that some churches can't afford to pay their own priest — with this newfound partnership, we hope many lessons on stewardship and mindset change will be availed to our brothers in Mukono, "he said.

He also noted that women in Mukono need to be empowered. "Majority of them spend much time indoors, cooking and attending to household duties — very few are engaged in any meaningful income generating activities." However he was quick to point out that that is a common problem in both Machakos and Mukono dioceses.

In another rare turn of events, call it God's way of bringing healing and reconciliation, Rev Patrick Munuve who was in another parish called Seeta, was captured by Ugandan media. He happened to preach in a service that many controversial political figures were in attendance. He also knew very little of an existing conflict within the church, yet God used him to deliver a sermon packed with messages of healing and reconciliation that was quoted by the local Ugandan media that a Kenyan had been sent to reconcile a warring church.

Overall, the groups' biggest nightmare was language. They talked through interpreters from English into the local Lusoga and Luganda languages, which sometimes proved difficult for some words to be well interpreted. They also dealt with many cases of witchcraft, demonic attacks and oppression.

In his concluding remarks, CMS-Africa International Director Dennis Tongoi expressed joy for the fruits born out of the partnership between the two Anglican dioceses that he says would have otherwise never learnt anything from each other. "This is the kind of Christian witness that we would love to see the church in Africa engaging in. When one community witnesses Christ to another, then mission has occurred, hence true transformation and mindset change," he said.

## TANZANIA 'POOR' CLERGY NOW RIDE MOTORBIKES AFTER MINDSET CHANGE TEACHINGS

ANGLICAN CHURCH PRIESTS IN THE DIOCESE OF MOROGORO WHO ONCE REGARDED THEM-SELVES AS POOR ARE NOW OWNERS OF BRAND **NEW MOTORCYCLES AFTER DISCOVERING THAT** REAL WEALTH IS IN THEIR OWN HANDS AS A RESULT OF THE SAMARITAN STRATEGY TEACH-INGS.

According to diocesan Bishop Geodfrey Sehaba, "I tell you friends, priests here used to come to my office begging for bus fare; the most they requested were bicycles," he says. "Right now, my job is to commission their brand new motorcycles." The diocese of Morogoro is among the few first dioceses in Tanzania to welcome CMS and CMS-Africa's Samaritan strategy programme which entails VISION Conferences. These are five

day seminars that aim at helping the African church discover its true potential and to discover that God created man inherent with all the resources he needed to create wealth. However, due to a poor mindset and a poverty mentality, majority of Africans wrongly believe that aid is the only solution to poverty.

According to diocesan development coordinator and also a Samaritan Strategy Africa Tanzania trainer, Canon Johnson Chinyongole, the clergy in his diocese suffered a donor mentality like many people across the continent.

"I had a hard time at first trying to convince them that all resources needed to create wealth were with us. One key milestone that saw the transformation of Morogoro is the Village Community Banks commonly known as VICOBAs: through them, clergy were able to save money and hence borrow part of their savings to engage in profitmaking ventures. The more they saved the more they borrowed and the more they engaged in business: that is why their lives have drastically changed. When we say they are riding motorbikes and not bicycles, I mean all other areas of their lives have changed positively."

## 'Water for a Thirsty Land'

'Water for Thirsty Land' is the book written by Jerica Davies. She chose the title following many years of observing children in Africa faithfully attending their Sunday classes but ironically not gaining so much from their teachers who were also ill-prepared. The teachers suffered too. They were unsure which bible story was relevant for the children and how to apply it to help them grow in Christ.

"In Kenya, like many other African nations, the children's ministry popularly known as 'Sunday School' has very few books or resources to help children grow in the faith." Observed Jeremy Davies, Jerica's husband whose role in writing and publishing of the book is also greatly acknowledged and affirmed by his wife.

This problem did not sit down very well with the couple who were then newly posted Church Mission Society (CMS) partners seconded to Kitui Anglican diocese in Eastern Kenya. They vowed to do something about it. Their passion for Africa was kindled years back when they visited their friends who were missionaries in Mozambique. When they visited Kenya in 2006, they too heeded God's call to serve as missionaries in Africa.

While in Kitui, the couple attended their first ever training for Sunday School teachers. "When my husband and I, took the children and their teachers through the first edition of this material, we found very encouraging feedback from all those who attended," says Jerica.

Most of them liked the book and found it useful in helping them develop skills on how to teach the children, she says. Although it has not been easy for the couple to work in Kenya, this new book, they believe, is the greatest resource for Sunday school children and their teachers, and also a big consolation to them; what better gift could they have left in Africa. In the book, Jerica combines bible stories and related practical




fun activities which she says are relevant for children of all age groups.

"When children read, comprehend, act and even draw lessons of life from a basic bible story like that of Moses or Joseph, I take it that they have understood scripture and interpreted it correctly. That is why when we prepared this book, we made sure it is full of activities and practical lessons that go hand in hand. We must all know that children are not adults, let's not bore them with endless sermons and complex passages," says Jerica.

Although the couple is now attached to All Saints' Cathedral in Nairobi, they have very fond memories of Kitui which to them is still home. In the book they acknowledge the clergy of Kitui diocese led by diocesan Bishop Rt. Rev. Josephat Mule for providing a platform for the book to be prepared. They also can't ignore the role played by their daughter, Katy, who is married to a South African Zulu man, Mr. Mtethwa. Jerica says, "Thank you my daughter, Katy Mtethwa, for providing many of the quotations used in the teaching tips. Katy and I have in the past worked together in children's groups at Emmanuel Church, South Croydon, UK, and what is written here owes a lot to that experience."

Currently, Jeremy is working on another book that he says will be resourceful for church clergy during sermon preparation. The book; Water for a Thirsty Land: Children's Ministry Resources — Year 1 written by Jerica Jane Davies was published by CMS-Africa. Pray for this ministry and for the work of CMS-Africa. 
